cyber-bullying	Using electronic communications to send violent, threatening, or harmful messages to someone.

Scam e-mails, phishing, and fraud!

- Email is a useful, collaborative tool. However, beware of scam and junk emails as they can be a problem. They can offer all kinds of **fake** things like **money, holidays**, and low prices for expensive products. **Check!** Look before you click on any links!
- Look out! Trying to trick someone into giving out information over email is called '**phishing**'. You might receive an email claiming to be from your bank or from a social networking site. They usually include a link to a **fake website that looks identical to the real one**. When you log in it sends your username and password to someone who will use it to access your real accounts.

If the email is not from a name that you recognise, then do not open it.



A subject saying you have won something.

Sometimes fake emails will say that you have won a prize or that they have an amazing deal for you.



What if I receive a scam or phishing e-mail?



- Forward it to report@phishing.gov.uk then delete the original e-mail. Tell a trusted adult.
- **The National Cyber Security Centre can help with phishing.**

Phishing: Don't Take the Bait



Scammers use familiar company names or pretend to be someone you know.



They ask you to click on a link or give passwords or bank account numbers. If you click on the link, they can install programs that lock you out of your computer and can steal your personal information.

What should I already know about privacy?



- Remember: we **never** share our full name with anyone online.
- Things like where we live or where we go to school should **never** be shared with strangers.
- Never share your passwords with other people.

- ✓ Ask a trusted adult to ensure your privacy settings are on so your location and profile are not public.
- ✓ Rather than use your name, use an alias (maybe your favourite cartoon character) for public profiles.
